#### DURATION

#### **VOCABULARY**

Drama – telling a story through actions and dialogue Dialogue – a conversation between two or more people

Pantomime – expressing your emotions and feelings through facial expression and gestures without using dialogue

Gestures – using a part of your body to show movement that has meaning

Events – something that has happened in a story

#### MATERIALS NEEDED

"Goldilocks and the Three Bears" Book

## **OBJECTIVES**

The students will be able to:

- pantomime simple actions.
- work as a team to pantomime a scene from a story including the characters and setting.
- retell the sequence of events in a story.

# **LESSON SEOUENCE**

"Today we are going to do some drama which is telling a story through actions and dialogue. What do you think I am doing?"

#### You, as a teacher, act out:

- Smelling a flower then cutting it to put in a vase
- Walking your dog
- Waiting in line in a drive through to order food
- Other actions of your choice

"What I just did is called pantomime; I was acting out something using gestures and facial expressions but not dialogue (words)."

Explain that gestures is using a part of your body to show an action without words. Step 1: Have students sit in a circle.

Step 2: "Now I want you to pantomime something but remember you are not allowed to use words, only actions:"

- Opening a birthday present you have always wanted.
- A monkey eating a banana.
- Eating a bowlful of something disgusting. "How do we know it is disgusting?" (facial expression)

Step 3: "Would someone like to try a pantomime and let us guess what you are doing?" Allow for several students to do so.

Step 4: "In a few minutes we are going to pantomime scenes or events from a story." Read "Goldilocks and the Three Bears".

Step 5: As a class, pantomime the beginning when the bears try the porridge and the ending when Goldilocks sees the three bears.

Step 6: Divide the class into 3 sections. Ask each section to talk as a group to decide how they want to pantomime Goldilocks tasting the porridge, Goldilocks sitting in the chairs and Goldilocks laying in the beds. Think of the ways that you can use your body to tell the scene. (Some students could be the props in the scene such as the chairs or beds) Remember, you cannot use words when you present your event from the story.

Step 7: Allow students a few minutes to work together then present.

Step 8: After the presentations ask the students to comment on what they saw. "Could we have changed anything?"

Step 9: "How did you feel when you were pantomiming and could not use words?"

Step 10: Review the characters, the setting and the sequence of events from the story

#### **FXTENDED LEARNING ACTIVITIES**

Use other story books; fairy tales work well. Draw, or write if later in the year, the sequence of events of the story. Change the characters, the setting or the ending in the story.
