Story Quilts/Tar Beach by Faith Ringgold 3rd Grade Adapted by Marsha Iverson/Clair Huff

Duration: 60-90 minutes OR two 30-45 minute sessions

Objectives:

Using the image of Tar Beach, students will learn how artwork can tell a story. (Visual Imagery)

After reading <u>Tar Beach</u> by Faith Ringgold, students will be able to identify the story elements.

The students will study the work of the artist and author, Faith Ringgold, then create a story quilt of their own.

The student will orally share their story with a partner then write a narrative about the story quilt created.

Materials Needed:

Image of artwork: Tar Beach by Faith Ringgold (Image below in resources)

Book: Tar Beach by Faith Ringgold (Youtube video in lesson sequence)

9 x 11 paper or larger - Student can draw a square in center for "story"

3 x 3 squares in assorted colors of scrapbook paper or fabric

Markers

Glue sticks or glue Yarn or ribbon strips

Lesson Sequence:

- 1. The teacher will share background on artist and author Faith Ringgold (in resources below). The teacher will display the artwork/image of Tar Beach by Faith Ringgold (in resources below) Quilting will be discussed as an artform and how quilts can tell stories as well as materials used in quiltmaking. The students will make predictions about the book <u>Tar Beach</u> by Faith Ringgold from the image.
- 2. The teacher will read aloud <u>Tar Beach</u> (AR 3.4) by Faith Ringold OR students can view the Youtube of Faith Ringold reading <u>Tar Beach</u>. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=h9RKJleFdBU
- 3. After reading the story the teacher will lead a discussion of the story setting, main characters and point of view in the book and artwork Tar Beach. Questions are in the resources section below.
- 4. The teacher will show the video (listed below in resources) of Faith Ringgold discussing how she created the story quilt, Tar Beach. The teacher will explain that

- students will be creating a mixed media creation inspired by the work of Faith Ringgold. Students can use a variety of materials to create their story.
- 5. Have students draw with markers a scene in the center of the paper showing a special place or a special activity that they do with their family.
- Students can then glue fabric or paper squares around the edge as a "quilt" border.
 Pattern (of placement of squares) can be discussed as quilters often use a pattern in their quilting.
- 7. Encourage students to continue to work and add items(yarn/ribbon) to embellish their story quilt.
- 8. Students will display the finished work and discuss it with a partner.
- 9. Students will write a narrative about the story quilt that they have created.
